TO OFFICERS ON HALF PAY.

War Office, May 10, 1804.

ALL Officers on the Half Pay of the Land Forces, whether resident in Great Britain, Ireland, or the adjacent Islands, are hereby required immediately to transmit to the Secretary at War, an Account, in Writing, of their Age, past Services, Rank, and present Place of Abode; and such as think themselves, from Age or Infirmitie, unfit for further Service, even in this Country, are to accompany their Reports with sufficient Vouchers of their Inability, and the Causes thereof.

The Officers on Half Pay who are serving in the Militia, Fencibles, or Volunteers, are to specify the Commission, which they respectively hold, and those otherwise employed under Government, the Nature of the public Situation, which they possess.

Every such Officer who shall neglect to make his Report within one Month from the Date hereof, will be considered as otherwise provided for, or dead, and his Name will be struck off the Half Pay List accordingly.

Whitehall, May 15, 1804.

WHEREAS it hath been humbly represented to the King, that, on the 17th of March last, between the Hours of Eight and Nine o'Clock in the Evening, at Benjamin Skene, an Officer employed under Captain Birchall, on the Service of raising Men for the Fleet at the City of Chester, was conducting, in a peaceable Manner, one Edward Jones, whom he had impressed, along Bridge-Street, in the said City, assisted by George Marshall (one of the Men employed under Captain Birchall on the above-mentioned Service), who was walking behind him; a Stone was thrown by some Person unknown, which struck the said George Marshall on the Left Side of his Head, and fractured his Skull, and that he died in consequence thereof on the 30th Day of April last;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in this atrocious Act, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One or more of the Offenders (except the Person who actually threw the said Stone) who shall discover his or their Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby offer a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to any Person or Persons (except as is before excepted) who shall apprehend, or cause to be apprehended, any of the said

Offenders, to be paid on the Conviction of any One or more of them by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy.

N. B. One James Fleming, who had been impressed, and was afterwards discharged on the Ground of his being an Apprentice, was in Company with the above-named Edward Jones at the Time he was impressed, and having left Chester on the Night the Blow was given, and not having been since heard of, strong Suspicions are entertained that he was the Person who threw the said Stone.

Bank of England, May 12, 1804.

THE Court of Directors of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, with the Approbation of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, having caused Dollars to be stamped at Mr. Boulton's Manufactory, with His Majesty's Head and an Inscription "Georgius III. Dei Gratia Rex," on the Obverse, and Britannia, with the Words "Five Shillings, Dollar, Bank of England, 1804" on the Reverse, which they propose to issue instead of the Dollars which have been lately stamped at His Majesty's Mint, at the Tower, the latter of which it is expedient to withdraw from Circulation; hereby give Notice, that those Dollars which have been stamped at the Tower since the 1st Day of January last, and which are now in circulation, will not be current, nor be received at the Bank at the Rate of 5s each, after the 2d Day of June next; and that from and after the 20th Instant, until the said 2d Day of June inclusive, they may be exchanged for Dollars with the new Stamp, or for Bank Notes, after the Rate of 5s. for each Dollar. Attendance will be given at the Bank for this Purpose, on Monday the 21st Instant, and the following Days, (Sundays and Fast Day excepted) until Saturday the 2d Day of June inclusive. But to avoid Confusion from a Crowd of Persons applying at the same Time, the Court finds it necessary to give Notice, that smaller Sums than Eight Dollars cannot be exchanged at the Bank.
